WHAT WE EXPECT IN THE 2022 STATE **LEGISLATIVE SESSION**

The 2022 Minnesota State Legislative Session started on January 31. Certainly, this will be a big year for elections, which typically casts a long shadow on everything else. The offices of the Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, State Auditor, and all U.S. House of Representatives members and all state senate and house legislative seats are up for election. The legislative district maps will be redrawn, so legislative candidates will not know who their voters are until spring. Based on 2020 census data, rural Minnesota will lose at least one legislative district and the Twin Cities will gain one.

There are several topics that we expect to come up this year. One of these will be broadband connectivity to rural Minnesota in areas that are unserved or underserved. A related issue revolves around attachments made to electric cooperative power poles. There are parties pushing for Minnesota to legislate a standard fee that electric cooperatives can charge cable and telecom providers for the use of co-op poles. Forprofit companies will have many lobbyists working on this initiative at the Capitol, which electric cooperatives will

oppose. Electric cooperatives do support reducing the digital divide in rural Minnesota. #1425800 However, the electric cooperatives also recognize that each electric cooperative sets its pole attachment fees based on its own unique costs. Standardizing pole attachment fees across the state would mean the possibility of fees that do not cover an electric cooperative's costs and therefore will subsequently require the co-op members, through the electric rates they pay, to subsidize the activities of for-profit companies.

Other topics we expect to be addressed are:

- Funding allocation for electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure developed in rural Minnesota.
- It is expected that there will be numerous proposals made to impose additional mandates impacting the ongoing transition to renewable energy sources. Electric cooperatives will continue to engage in these discussions with an eye toward ensuring continued relative cost stability and reliable electric service.
- Also: home weatherization assistance; railway crossing issues; property tax issues; and the implementation of the Energy Conservation and Optimization (ECO) Act.

Sharing in the retirement of Capital Credits is a benefit of your membership in Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative (FMEC). Capital Credits represent member equity in the cooperative. Each member is assigned a Capital Credit account. As you pay your electric bills, the co-op tracks your electric consumption and the revenue received from your account. Through the retirement of Capital Credits, you receive your share of the co-op's excess revenue after all bills are paid.

Each year, we have some former members who we can no longer locate in order to retire their Capital Credits. #1997801 When Capital Credits go unclaimed, the funds are used to support the higher education of our members and/or their children who reside in our local area.

LUCK OF THE DRAW SCHOLARSHIP

OPERATION ROUND UP® PROGRAM AWARDS \$17,555

Your small change adds up! Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative's (FMEC) Operation Round Up® program distributed \$17,555 to 28 area organizations and charitable causes in 4th guarter 2021. A list of area organizations receiving funds can be viewed at www.fmec.coop.

Through ORU, FMEC gives its member-owners the opportunity to give back to the community by rounding up their monthly electric bill to the nearest dollar. The rounded up funds, no more than \$11.88 per year, per member, are placed in a trust fund that is administered by a Trust Board comprised of FMEC membervolunteers.

READY TO RESCUE

The Geneva Volunteer Fire Department, was established in 1919. Recently, the department has responded to an average of sixty calls per year, about forty-five of which are medical related. It is one of fifteen departments in Freeborn County and consists of twenty-two volunteers, of which four are EMTs and six are First Responders.

The department is equipped to conduct automobile extrication, grain bin rescue, medical calls, and any other emergency that might arise. The department is a member of the Freeborn County Fire Association comprised of the Sheriff's Department, Mayo Ambulance, Freeborn County Dispatchers, Freeborn County Emergency Manager, Red Cross, and the local community colleges.

BE PREPARED FOR WINTER STORMS AND POWER OUTAGES

When your power goes out, so do we!



Winter storms can cause prolonged power outages by weighing power lines down with ice, causing trees to fall into lines, or creating hazardous road conditions resulting in vehicle accidents with power poles. To safely weather a winter outage, you need to prepare and know what to do when a storm strikes.

When outages occur, our crews work diligently to restore electric service, no matter the weather conditions. Please have patience, as it may take time to deal with the aftermath of storms and high winds. Our goal is to have electric service restored as quickly and safely as possible. Please review the accompanying article on how Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative (FMEC) approaches widespread power outages.

For your family's comfort and safety, be prepared for whatever Mother Nature sends our way.

- Have on hand a ready supply of canned, non-perishable food and bottled water, medicines, and necessities like baby supplies. Extra blankets or sleeping bags should be easily accessible. Check that your flashlights work and that you have fresh replacement batteries.
- Avoid using candles. Do not bring indoors any gas or charcoal grills. These are for outdoor cooking only and pose grave safety concerns, both for fire and air quality, if used improperly in a confined area.

Make an emergency plan to move to a safe and warm location, should that become necessary.

• First, consider if it is safe to leave your home. For instance, it may be better to not risk snow covered roads in a blizzard. If you do leave, make sure that family members or close friends know where you will be going.

Always assume downed power lines are still energized.

- Just because a power line is down, there is a strong chance that it remains energized. Touching it could cause electrocution!
- Should your vehicle slide off the road and strike a power pole or other utility equipment, please be aware that broken wires may still be energized. This could mean a wire contacting the vehicle has also energized the vehicle. Stay inside the vehicle and use a cell phone to call for help. Wait inside until law enforcement and utility personnel arrive.
- Trees and branches may tear down power lines. #1581203 Always watch out for downed power lines that may have been hidden by snow and stay away!

Stages of Power Restoration

Major storms or natural disasters may cause widespread damage and extended power outages. FMEC takes a methodical and sequential process to restore power in these circumstances. This is to bring power back to the greatest number of FMEC members as soon as possible. Our crews start with the greatest number of members impacted and work our way down to the individual member sites.

1. High voltage transmission lines supply to **STEP** substations. Thousands of FMEC members 01may be affected if the transmission lines are damaged. These must be repaired before other

parts of the system can operate. **STEP** 2. Assuming the transmission line(s) is 02 functioning, we must now check the distribution substation. Hundreds or even thousands of cooperative members can be served from a distribution substation. Repairs must be made to the substation before our crews look further

down the line. **STEP** 3. If the problem cannot be isolated at the 03 distribution substation, the main distribution feeders are the next to be checked.

STEP 4. If local outages persist, tap lines are the next 04to be inspected. These lines deliver power to transformers, either mounted on poles or placed on pads for underground service.

STEP 5. If your home remains without power, the 05 service line between the transformer and your home may need to be repaired. Members may need to hire an electrician to repair their equipment as well.

BE ALERT FOR PEAK ALERTS



During periods of extreme temperatures (low or high), Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative (FMEC) might issue Peak Alert Warnings via local radio stations, local television stations, and on social media.

A peak alert situation means there is an increased demand for energy that can tax the generation, transmission, and distribution system. #1425800 To meet demand, the co-op's wholesale supplier might have to go on the open market to purchase power. This can be very expensive and result in increased costs for the Cooperative.

Members can help keep rates stable and affordable by conserving electricity during the Peak Alert period. FMEC encourages members to participate and shift flexible usage such as dishwashing and laundry, if possible. We also recommend adjusting your thermostat and seeking alternative forms of entertainment that don't use electricity, such as board games and reading, during these periods.
