STAYING MISSION FOCUSED

I've been reflecting on the many ways throughout the year that Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative has fulfilled our commitment to power our members' lives. There are so many disparate aspects to our mission it is impossible to cover them all in one article, so I've narrowed it down to just a few.

RELIABILITY:

This involves everything from the energy source, the electric generation and transmission system, to our substations, and then through our FMEC distribution system, all the way to the meter at your home or business. #254808 The Operations Department focused on redundancy of our main feeder lines, replacement and upgrades to infrastructure equipment, and reducing the susceptibility of exposed powerlines.

LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS:

Energy policy has been a hot topic, especially as society moves toward drastic reductions in carbon. The electric industry cannot turn on a dime. It requires long lead times to ensure there will be enough capacity consistently available to supply the growing demand and consumption of electricity. To this end, we remain engaged with lawmakers on the state and federal levels.

SAFETY:

The safety of the public and our employees is of utmost importance. We place a strong emphasis on ongoing

training and safety protocols, along with participating in community safety programs and providing information through our County Lines newsletter and social media outlets.

TECHNOLOGY:

We continue to incorporate technologies that help us track and analyze our electric reliability, demands, and consumption patterns. Additionally, we've translated information into reports that are useful to our members regarding their individual accounts. You can easily access important information through SmartHub. A review of the information now included on your monthly billing statement shows a lot more than the amount due. You will find a snapshot on your electric consumption that also shows the average temperature and the last 12 months of use. We also give you a breakdown of your current bill on a daily cost basis. There are also important messages printed on the statement. By providing this information, we hope to give you the tools to increase your understanding and control of your electric consumption.

From all of us here at FMEC, we look forward to continuing to deliver on our commitment to our members during the year ahead.



In the third quarter of 2023, Operation Round Up® grants were awarded to 51 area organizations and totaled \$25,021.49. The cost of participating is minimal, between 1 and 99 cents per month, yet the program's impact on communities throughout FMEC's service territory is making a great difference. #254808, This program is built on the cooperative objective of working together, working for you.

Operation Round Up® is a nonprofit, opt-out program that "rounds up" your electric bill to the next whole dollar amount. The difference of just a few cents each month is pooled to fund worthy endeavors. Only nonprofit organizations/endeavors are considered for grants. The money collected for the program is held separately from FMEC's finances. Grants are awarded quarterly and are determined by the program's board of trustees. Your donations are tax-deductible.

COLD WEATHER RULE

Members experiencing difficulty paying their winter electric bills are reminded that Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule is in effect through April 30. If you cannot pay your electric bill by the due date, you must contact our office to arrange a payment plan. Electric service may still be discontinued, even during the winter months, if you fail to respond to the disconnect notice.



NEW DAY — MARK YOUR CALENDERS

Our next Annual Meeting will be held on a new day and time of the week. We will meet on Tuesday evening, March 26, 2024 at Albert Lea High School. Watch our newsletter and the Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative social media accounts for further announcements.



Daylight hours are shorter and we're indoors for longer periods of time. Along with increased use of our home heating systems, we are also using more lighting.

This doesn't necessarily mean that we must consume more electricity for home lighting. You can choose to change many lighting fixtures to long-lasting and energy-efficient LED bulbs.

When purchasing LED, or light-emitting diode bulbs, read the Energy Facts label. #16002 Look for the ENERGY STAR label. It will provide information on life expectancy for that bulb and the amount of energy it will use. Probably the most significant information to a purchaser will be the brightness and color appearance of the light emitted.

BRIGHTNESS

Regarding brightness, you will no longer be looking for a bulb of a specific Wattage, but instead will be comparing Lumen ratings.

This is a comparison according to the Department of Energy:

INCANDESCENT	LED EQUIVALENT
100 Watts	1,600 Lumens
75 Watts	1,100 Lumens
60 Watts	800 Lumens
40 Watts	450 Lumens

COLOR APPEARANCE

How the light will appear from cool to warm is measured on a color gradient known as the Kelvin scale. Select the appearance of the bulb based on the task area in which it will be placed and your personal preference.

PLACES OF USE

If you are replacing a bulb within a tightly enclosed fixture, you may want to inquire from the retailer if the new bulb is approved for that use. Although the heat output of LED bulbs is considerably less than that of incandescent, an enclosure that is too tight may not allow enough heat to escape and therefore reduce the life of the new bulb.

LED bulbs are not designed for use in an oven.

CO-OP PRINCIPLE #2: DEMOCRATIC MEMBER CONTROL

DEADLINE FOR DIRECTOR APPLICATIONS

Are you interested in serving within Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative's leadership? Three districts will soon be holding an election for their director representative.

Elections will be held in districts 1, 4, and 7. Each term will be for three years. You must reside in the district in which you are running for director. Your director district is shown on your electric statement.

DISTRICT 1: Represents the northwest part of Albert Lea, Freeborn, Hartland, Manchester, and Clarks Grove areas.

DISTRICT 4: Represents areas near and including, Elkton, Grand Meadow, Adams, Taopi, and LeRoy.

DISTRICT 7: Represents the areas in and around Alden, Conger, Twin Lakes, and Emmons.

Applicants must meet all eligibility requirements as specified in the Cooperative's Bylaws. Among the qualifications and responsibilities outlined in the Bylaws, nominees must be:

- 1. a current member receiving electric service at their primary residence,
- 2. the primary residence must be in the district in which the director is elected.

No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of the Cooperative who:

- 1. is not a natural person and a member of the Cooperative, receiving service at the member's primary residence in the district from which the director is elected:
- 2. within five (5) years preceding a director candidate's nomination was or during service on the Board of Directors is finally adjudged to be guilty of a felony;
- 3. is in any way employed by or substantially financially interested in an enterprise competing with the Cooperative or any Cooperative affiliated business;
- 4. is employed by, materially affiliated with, or has a financial interest in, any individual or entity possessing a material or substantial conflict of interest with the Cooperative or a Cooperative subsidiary

Applications are due by 3:30 p.m. on December 11, 2023. Please contact our office to obtain a Directorship Application Packet.

ELECTION PROCESS

Completed applications are due at our office by 3:30 p.m. on December 11, 2023. After applications have been returned, members in each of the three districts holding an election will be notified of those who have filed.

POST FILING DEADLINE — NOMINATION BY PETITION

After the filing application deadline has expired, persons may still be nominated by filing a petition form, also available from our office. To become a nominee by petition requires fifteen (15) members from the district in which the election is being held to sign in support of a particular nominee on the petition form. The petition form must be submitted to the cooperative office by 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, January 17, 2024.

WHEN THERE IS A SINGLE NOMINEE

Should only one nominee in a district come forward before the final deadline by petition, that applicant will be deemed elected as Director.

WHEN THERE ARE MULTIPLE NOMINEES

Should more than one nominee come forth by the petition deadline, either by direct nomination or petition, a biography of each nominee and a mail ballot will be sent to all members in the district on Wednesday, January 31, 2024. Returned ballots will be due on Monday, February 19, 2024. Ballots will be accepted through February 20 due to President's Day.

Please return mailed ballots in the proper envelopes to the third-party ballot company and not to our cooperative. Also, allow for any possible mail delays.

DIRECTORS BEGIN TERM

The elected Directors will be seated during the Annual Meeting on Tuesday evening, March 26, 2024.

It is also a time when energy usage can increase; leaving an impact on your electric bill. However, you don't have to become a Scrooge to conserve energy during the holidays. Whether you're visiting family, decorating the brightest house on the block, or staying in with festive movies and treats, here are some ways to save energy during the holiday season. #16002 Here are a few simple ways to be energy-conscious while celebrating the most wonderful time of the year!

LIGHTING AND DECOR

Make the switch to LED Christmas lights; they're brighter, longer-lasting, and more energy-efficient than traditional incandescent lights. Fiber optic decorations, with their LED bulbs, offer energy savings along with shatterproof and shock-resistant features. Use timers to manage lights, setting them for eight hours or less to minimize costs. Consider decorating without lights, opting for reflective ornaments, candles, ribbons, and garlands to add festive charm without increasing your electric bill.



HOME HEATING
