# RESIDENTIAL ELECTRIC HEAT TAX EXEMPTION

Residential consumers using electricity as their primary heat source (50% or more) are exempt from sales tax for the billing months of November, December, January, February, March, and April.

Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative requires a signed certificate stating that your primary source of heat is electricity. The purpose is: 1) It notifies FMEC to remove the sales tax from your bill for the qualifying months. 2) Should FMEC be audited by the Department of Revenue, FMEC would utilize the exemption certificate signed by you as our authority to remove the sales tax. This is for the protection of the cooperative. If FMEC were audited and it was found that the consumer's bill was illegally exempted, it would be the responsibility of the individual consumer to pay any amount due, plus penalties.

If this tax exemption applies to you, please submit a completed certification form to FMEC. The certificate is available from our office or can be downloaded from our website: **www.fmec.coop**. The downloadable form can be found under the **SERVICES** tab, Forms, Downloadable Information, Exemption Forms.

If you have previously submitted a form, there's no need to submit a new form. However, if you are no longer exempt from sales tax, please contact our office.

Separately metered electric heat does not require the completion of this form. Your electric heat usage is already exempt under that agreement.

# YOUR COOPERATIVE, YOUR VOICE: 2026 DIRECTOR ELECTION INFORMATION

Throughout our history at Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative (FMEC), we have never strayed from our commitment to serve our member-owners. We do not take this responsibility lightly, and part of ensuring we continue to operate with our members' best interests in mind is through the governance of our board of directors. Directors elected from and by our cooperative membership provide the policy direction for FMEC.

#### **2026 DIRECTOR ELECTION INFORMATION**

Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative is governed by nine directors who are member-owners of the cooperative. #1977301. Elections are held in three different districts each year. Board members are elected by the membership and serve a three-year term. Directors meet monthly at the cooperative headquarters, typically on the last Tuesday of each month.

Nominations are now open for interested members in District 3, District 6, and District 9.

- District 3: Represents areas northwest of Austin, Sargeant, Brownsdale, Nicolville, and Dexter.
- District 6: Represents Hayward, Glenville, and areas west of Gordonsville.
- **District 9:** Represents the northern part of the city of Albert Lea.

If you are a member of Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative who lives in one of the districts up for election and would like to run for the position of FMEC director, stay tuned for more details in the November issue of the County Lines Newsletter.

- Board members must attend monthly board meetings and other special meetings as they are called.
- They are responsible for the adoption of policies, to assure the democratic functioning of the cooperative in accordance with the Bylaws, and respect the confidentiality of information provided, among many other duties.

Any member meeting the Bylaw Qualifications who has a desire to become a director of the cooperative, may apply for an open board position. This includes minorities, women, and individuals with a disability.

# INDUSTRY LEADERS POINT TO NUCLEAR AS ANSWER TO CARBON FREE GOALS

In August, Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative's President and CEO, Jim Krueger, and several industry leaders convened for the Minnesota Rural Electric Association's Energy Issues Summit, an annual conference for the state's electric cooperative leaders.

Several speakers underscored the importance of nuclear power as a reliable energy source and a key factor in achieving carbon reduction goals for Minnesota and the nation.

Ryan Long, Executive Vice-President, Chief Legal and Compliance Officer at Xcel Energy Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, which operates two nuclear plants in Minnesota, acknowledged the need for nuclear to meet carbon free goals.

"If you are very serious about carbon reduction, reliability, and resource adequacy, nuclear has to be part of the conversation," Long stated. "It is a dispatchable, carbon-free, base-load energy source that has been part of our system since the late 1960s. It works."

Robert Bryce, a journalist, author, and nationally recognized energy expert, agreed during his presentation.

"If you are serious about reducing CO2 emissions, you have to be serious about nuclear," he said. #1997000 Bryce questioned Minnesota's ability to reach carbon free goals by 2040, especially without nuclear resources.

Energy density is one of the major benefits of nuclear energy, according to some of the speakers. Bryce said nuclear uses 2,000 times less land than wind and 200 times less land than solar.

Paul Wilson, a professor of nuclear energy at the University of Wisconsin, also emphasized the energy density of nuclear power.

"One of the reasons nuclear energy is gaining attention," Wilson explained, "is its exceptional energy density. Resource consumption, land use — everything — is smaller for nuclear compared to most other energy technologies."

He explained that if all the energy consumed by an average American over their lifetime was provided by nuclear power, the resulting waste would fit into a soda can. Moreover, all spent nuclear fuel is solid, easily contained, carefully tracked, and has a decades long track record of being handled safely.

He presented findings from his research on deep decarbonization, stressing the need for firm, dispatchable, low-emission generation. His studies show the inefficiency of relying only on renewables and energy storage.

Ron Starner, from Site Selection magazine, discussed the growing electric demand required by data centers. U.S. electric demand from data centers will double over the next five years and is expected to reach 35 gigawatts by 2030.

Tony Clark, executive director of the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners, provided a regulatory perspective and also highlighted the need for more reliable power. He cited four major trends in the utility industry: rapid demand growth, large-scale retirements of dispatchable generation, carbon constrained policy environment, and no easy near-term carbon free capacity replacement.

These speakers, along with others, provided a highly educational and inspirational conference for Minnesota's electric cooperative leaders.

"It's always beneficial to hear the viewpoints and perspectives of experts in the energy industry and how we might take their knowledge and apply it to our home cooperative," said Jim Krueger.

## OCTOBER IS CYBERSECURITY AWARENESS MONTH

With the holiday season fast approaching, it's more important than ever to stay vigilant against gift card scams.

Scammers often exploit this time of year by impersonating government officials or representatives from well-known companies, pressuring individuals to resolve fake debts or legal issues by paying with gift cards. These imposter scams are designed to create panic and urgency, leading victims to act quickly without verifying the legitimacy of the request.

Another growing threat involves tampered gift cards. This is where criminals scratch off PINs on store shelves and wait for unsuspecting buyers to activate them, allowing the scammers to drain the funds remotely. #1977301 Online scams are also rampant, with fake sellers on platforms like Facebook Marketplace asking for gift card payments for items that never arrive.

To protect yourself, remember these key tips:

- Inspect physical cards for signs of tampering before purchase.
- Only buy gift cards from official retailer websites or trusted vendors.
- Be cautious of unsolicited messages offering free or discounted gift cards—they're almost always scams.
- Always remember that if it seems suspicious, reduce the speed of your clicking and thoroughly investigate any activity or request that appears abnormal. Staying informed and alert is your best defense this season.





# WINTER LOAD MANAGEMENT REMINDERS

Freeborn Mower Electric Cooperative offers members load management programs to help reduce electricity consumption during high-demand times, while energy market prices are elevated. These programs support our commitment to grid reliability, and serve to lower overall energy costs, promote sustainable energy use, and ensure dependable service for all members.

Residential electric water heaters and auto-start generators enrolled in load management will be controlled in the following situations:

- During a Maximum Generation Event, a minimum of four times per year (once each season) to a maximum of 16 times per year. A Max Gen Event can be declared at any time of the year.
- When electricity prices increase in the MISO market, or when local conditions may impact reliability of the FMEC system, we take proactive steps to ensure continued service and stability for our members.

Additionally, winter load control events will be split into morning and evening events during December through February. During times of highest demand for electricity, enrolled interruptible heat (dual fuel) loads will be managed in the mornings, beginning at 6:55 a.m., with restoral starting at 10:00 a.m. Enrolled dairy water heaters, grain dryers, and manual stand-by generators are on the traditional winter schedule of control beginning at 4:55 p.m., with all loads restored by 8:30 p.m.
